

THIS IS AN IMPORTANT CHAIRMAN'S MESSAGE THAT ALL BU3A MEMBERS SHOULD READ IN FULL.

I am writing this just 10 days into August to meet the Buzz deadline and we are having a few days of sunshine after a disappointing July. I'm hoping that the rest of August will be better because lots of us are away on holiday or enjoying the month of grandparent childcare; good weather certainly helps both

Our new Committee of 14 was elected at the June AGM and has been very busy on your behalf. I was at the Yorkshire and Humberside Region (YAHR) Summer School at York over four days in August and lots of the informal talk at the packed venue was about how to increase membership and get people to stand for Committee. People seemed baffled by the amazing Barnsley statistics, 1250 members, 130 groups; 14 on Committee and lots of new members joining all the time.

Two major issues have arisen recently:

1) u3a National contacted all u3as to tell us that some unspecified u3as have recently been fined for breach of Copyright. Most of us thought that the 'blanket cover' that u3a offers us meant that we could photocopy certain things relatively freely but this is not so. Music must **never** be photocopied. Images, pictures and photos on the internet are generally **not free to copy**. We know that one u3a member (not Barnsley) was fined £360 for using just one image. He was 'let off' when the image owner heard that it was for u3a use but not everyone will be so lenient. This has made every member of Committee think very hard about the responsibilities that we have accepted in being Bu3a Committee members. The u3a organisation is meant to be pure fun but we are dealing with major legal matters at present. We are seeking additional advice and training and investigating what additional licenses we require for Bu3a to run smoothly and legally.

Sadly, both **Helen Simms**, our Vice-Chairman and Buzz Editor and **Janet Elvy**, our Business Secretary, have stood down from Committee due to a range of personal matters, including the Copyright liability mentioned above.

Happily, Helen wants to continue producing The Buzz for us and they are both happy to continue helping Webmaster, Robin Northcut, in the development of the Simple Membership management and website system.



I am most grateful, as you will be also, to new Committee member, Carmel Seston, who has agreed to be our new Vice-Chair.



Very grateful also to Sue Stokes, our Events Officer, for taking on, additionally and temporarily, the Business Secretary role.

2) Other news to all u3as from u3a National was that our insurers, Aviva, are requiring u3a members to be 'safer' when attending meetings and we are responding by ensuring that all our venues and group members are as safe as can be. We are fortunate to have on Committee two specialists in this area, Jean Embury, our Groups Safety Officer, and Fred Brookes; both worked professionally in this field. Many 'Activity Safety Checks' have been carried out by them over the past three months and the process will continue until all 127 of our groups have been visited. We can prove to Aviva that Barnsley u3a is working hard to satisfy their demands. My sincere thanks to these two new members of Committee and to all the Coordinators who appreciate the work that has to be done.

Finally, I would like to thank and congratulate our wonderful **Beth Rudkin** for her work at the YAHR Summer School. Beth was put in charge of the delivery of the courses this year and the event was a massive success. Barnsley can be proud of itself as five of the ten tutors were from Bu3a, namely Beth, Sue Stokes, Christine Palmer, Jeremy Dinsdale and myself. It was also great to see Bu3a members there as delegates.



FIONA'S FOOD MEMORIES

Fiona Clark's memories are quite different from many of our members'. As many families did, Fiona's family visited grandparents every Sunday. Part of the Sunday ritual was a gong which was rung once to indicate handwashing time then which told the family to go directly to the dining room where lunch was served. Grandfather always carved the meat, and the first portions went to the kitchen and staff as all employees were treated with the utmost respect. Family servings followed. All the people who were employed in the house were from the streets. The family would help to give people a better start in life and sent some into further education or trained them in gardening or silver service.

In her own home the family would eat in the kitchen unless visitors were present. For visitors, the dining room would have been used and the best china crockery and solid silver cutlery would be brought out. How many of our members still get out the best crockery and cutlery for visitors?

One recipe that stood out from Fiona's memories was for Inverness Eggs. These were made in a ramakin dish with sausage meat around the side and eggs in the centre. These were then baked in the oven. They sound so tasty.

Another dish in her memory was Scottish sausage which was very spicy and flat, sometimes known as Lorne sausage. Scottish pie was made with a hot water crust pastry and filled with spicy mince and onion. Space was left on the top of the pie so that it could be topped with baked beans.

Fiona's mother would always have a stock pot on the go and made wonderful soups with the contents.

Friday afternoons were taken up with baking. One of the tastiest biscuits she made were Imperial biscuits.

These were two thin shortbread biscuits sandwiched with raspberry jam, topped with white icing. Crowning the whole biscuit would be a glacé cherry.

COOKERY CORNER

BREAKFAST MUFFINS

Makes 6

8 medium eggs

2 spring onions (chopped)

6 cherry tomatoes

1 small red pepper (chopped)

A few leaves of baby spinach

50g of grated cheese

Pinch of oregano

Salt and pepper

Pre-heat the oven to 180°. Grease a muffin tin.

Beat the eggs, then add onions, pepper, spinach, half the cheese and season with salt and pepper.

Mix well.

Pour some mixture into each of the muffin bowls, 2/3 full.

Press a cherry tomato into each muffin, sprinkle the remaining cheese over each one, then sprinkle the oregano over the top.

Bake in the oven for 15-20 mins until puffed up and golden brown.

Best served warm.

SPOTLIGHT ON LISA HAMMOND Bu3a CHAMPION



There are people, not members of Barnsley u3a, who help us with promotions, encourage people to join and help us get the u3a word out into the community. I felt it was time to recognise one of the key people, who you may never have heard of, but who is a staunch supporter of our organisation.

Lisa Hammond is Community Champion for Tesco in Stairfoot. I contacted her to ask if I could write a short piece about her and her work. She was delighted to be asked and we immediately set a date to meet. On the day, Lisa led me into the Community Room only to be confronted by an invitation to take part in a sponsored leg wax. Fortunately, the event had taken place, but it was certainly an insight into her job. (Incidentally, they used so many wax strips doing test patches on the volunteers that, on the day of the event, they only had enough strips to do the fronts of legs.)

Leg waxing is one of many challenges that Lisa organises for a whole host of local charities. It certainly doesn't sound like your average desk job. A colleague or customer with a personal connection to a particular charity or representative of a charity will contact her for either a donation or to organise a fundraising event. Examples range from the humble raffle or tombola to the more adventurous abseiling and the famous Peak District Challenge, a 20-mile hike along the Edale skyline. Organising events is one thing, but you'll find Lisa taking part. A video I saw of her screaming as she abseiled down the Owen Building, at Sheffield Hallam University, shows her level of commitment. The surplus food and plants from the store go to local food banks, where Lisa also cooks and serves at local food clubs.



Local is key for Lisa. She's Stairfoot born and bred and believes passionately in her community. She began work for Tesco in 2013 in the Opticians franchise, but when the Community Engagement post became vacant, she knew it was the role for her. Blessed with boundless energy, she's made a real impact and is driven to make a difference for local people.

She talks of her colleagues, Tesco customers and the volunteers who work for local charities and they're clearly an inspiration to her, "brilliant people doing brilliant things" and regards her job as a privilege.



In 2017, together with some friends, she formed 'Friends of Stairfoot', an organisation aimed at making the area a better place. This involves the ubiquitous litter pick, but the group is also committed to improving the area with planting, benches and reversing the effects of vandalism. With the little free time she has left, she volunteers as a Youth Worker for the YMCA.

Despite seeing hundreds of people representing scores of charities, Lisa knows Bu3a well. Letting us use the store for leafletting and promotional days, or to let our music groups play in the foyer to raise money for our own charities. She makes us feel welcome and ensures we're comfortable. The Tesco Community Room is one of our venues and she remembers the Bu3a Magician of the Year Competition with great fondness.

Honestly, this isn't a paid promotion, but I will report that Lisa is proud to work for Tesco and respects their commitment to engaging with the local community. The green token scheme that you will have seen in their stores nationally have raised £100 million since its inception in 2016. I would say they're very lucky to have her.

SAFETY IN THE BUZZ

Some of you are going to say you know all the fire drill stuff, did it at work, don't need to be told, etc. But at some of the venues we have checked the fire exits have not been fully accessible. Derek Bacon's Chairman's Message in this Buzz emphasises that the Committee is legally required to ensure that Bu3a members know and follow the rules.



Fire exits are a very important and very desirable aspect of our safety when we are happily getting on with our living, laughing, and learning at the various venues that we use for Bu3a. Unlikely to be used but vital that they are accessible when they are required.

These quiet and unassuming fire exit doors can look very different, have different shaped signs, different ways of opening and different colours.

However, all fire exits must:-

- 1. Be kept clear at all times, inside and out, access routes clear too.
 - 2. Open quickly and easily
- 3. Always be readily accessible when we are present:
 - a. Shutters raised
 - b. Bolts lifted
 - c. Unlocked

About the Activity Safety Checks

Coordinators and Group members should familiarise themselves with venue fire exits and highlight any issues to the venue management or a Bu3a committee member.


